"The work of Rozanne Jackson reflects the innate understanding that residential design always walks a tight-rope between creating a strong visual statement and, at the same time, a space that is warm, welcoming and inviting. Design, punch and comfort co-exist beautifully in all of the work," said Corrigan commenting on Rozanne Jackson.

"These spaces possess a quality known as genus loci, where there is a conversation already at play before you get there – all you need to do is join in," McAlpine describing John and Vivian Benicichs' work.

"The architecture hearkens to another era and evokes a romantic sensibility, but doesn't fall into clichés. These are decidedly 21st century homes created with an authentic spirit," said Smith referring to Ken Purley and Craig Dixon.
